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# Coast Clever Campaign introduction

HM Coastguard is called to around 36,000 incidents each year, with peak times during the summer holidays and half terms. Despite equal recognition of risk between genders, men are far more likely to have a fatal accident and in 2024 males accounted for 84% of all drownings in the UK. This campaign aims to reshare coastal safety messaging with our primary audience of males under 30 years of age, encouraging positive behaviours and reminding them of common dangers at the coast.

Coast Clever focuses on four key themes - tidal cut off, offshore winds, cliff safety and mud.

This toolkit will help you share the key safety messages. We have included a range of resources to promote the campaign on your channels and local area.

### Social copy

#### Simply copy and paste the below into your social posts.

#### Mud:

Low tides can expose dangerous sinking sand and mud at the coast.

Look for the yellow warning signs and stay clear on your visit – never try to cross mud as a shortcut because you can easily get stuck.

- Check the tide times before you leave home.
- Watch out for the yellow warning signs.
- If you do get stuck, lean back to spread your weight.
- Stop other people from trying to help you as they might get stuck too.

In an emergency at the coast, call 999 and ask for the Coastguard.

Tide:

Don't get trapped by incoming tides. Rapidly rising sea levels at the coast can trap you with very little warning, leaving you in serious danger.

Stay safe and reduce the risks:

- Check the weather forecast and tide times before you go.
- Tell someone where you're going and when you'll be back.
- Set off for a walk when the tide is going out, not coming in.
- Ensure you take a charged phone.

In a coastal emergency, call 999 and ask for the Coastguard.

#### Offshore wind:

Offshore winds at the coast can be dangerous. If you're using a paddleboard or kayak, the wind can quickly sweep you out to sea and make it extremely difficult to return to shore.

- Avoid paddleboarding when the wind is blowing from the land out to sea.
- Don't paddle out if you see an orange windsock.
- Never use inflatables in the sea.
- If you're in trouble, stay with your paddleboard or kayak so rescue teams can see you.

#### Cliffs:

Rocks and cliff falls can happen at any time and getting too close to the edge or base of the cliff can put you in serious danger.

Stay safe and reduce the risks:

- Stay well back from cliff edges.
- Keep to the proper signposted paths.
- Wear sturdy shoes.

In a coastal emergency, call 999 for the Coastguard.

#### Mud:

Ar yr arfordir, gall llanw isel ddod â mwd a thywod sy'n suddo i'r amlwg, felly byddwch yn wyliadwrus. Mewn argyfwng ar yr arfordir, ceisiwch ymestyn eich corff yn lletach a ffonio 999 a gofyn am Wylwyr y Glannau.

Low tides can expose sinking sand and mud at the coast, so look out for warning signs. In a coastal emergency, spread your weight and call 999 for the Coastguard.

#### Tide:

Peidiwch â chael eich dal gan y llanw. Cynlluniwch o gwmpas amseroedd y llanw a dweud wrth rywun ble ydych chi'n mynd. Mewn argyfwng ar yr arfordir, ffoniwch 999 a gofyn am Wylwyr y Glannau.

Don't get trapped by incoming tides. Plan around tide times and let someone know where you are. In a coastal emergency, call 999 for the Coastguard.

#### **Offshore wind:**

Gall y gwynt eich chwythu allan i'r môr yn gyflym. Os byddwch mewn trafferth, arhoswch gyda'ch padlfwrdd neu gaiac. Mewn argyfwng, ffoniwch 999 a gofyn am Wylwyr y Glannau.

The wind can quickly blow you out to sea. If you get in trouble, stay with your paddleboard or kayak. In an emergency, call 999 for the Coastguard.

#### Cliffs:

Gall clogwyni gwympo ar unrhyw adeg, a gall mynd yn rhy agos at yr ymyl fod yn beryglus iawn. Mewn argyfwng ar yr arfordir, ffoniwch 999 a gofyn am Wylwyr y Glannau.

Cliff falls can happen at any time and getting too close to the edge can put you in serious danger. In a coastal emergency, call 999 for the Coastguard.

The PR film features singer and comedian Arthur Hill. Arthur fulfils the persona of a young male city dweller who is not as familiar with the dangers at the coast or how to keep himself and his mates safe.

The tone of the video is humorous with a serious message – never underestimate the coast.

The coastguard rescue teams did a brilliant job of demonstrating what a cliff rescue is like, but I certainly wouldn't want to get caught out and will be checking tide times ahead of my future visits to the coast."

### Key safety tips

HM Coastguard's top tips for staying safe at the coast:

- Check the weather forecast and tide times before you set off
- Cliffs can be unstable so stay clear of cliff edges and bases
- Watch out for warning signs for mud and never cross it as a shortcut
- If you do get stuck in mud, lean back to spread your weight
- Avoid water sports when the wind is blowing from land out to sea
- Tell someone where you are going and what time you'll be back
- Take a fully charged mobile phone
